# The Tuesday Election

## Mail or Drop Off Your Ballot Or Vote In Person

The ballot you received in the mail must be postmarked on or before Election Day, March 5, 2024 and received by March 12, 2024. Ballots can be returned by mail, at a drop-off location, or at your county elections office. Polling places will be open, but only 7am-8pm on Tuesday. Be sure to sign the envelope before you mail or drop off your ballot.

Tracking your ballot - including being notified when it has been received - has never been easier! Just go to <u>ballottrax.com</u> and register to be notified (via email, text message, or a phone call - your choice) when your ballot is received. You are welcome to drop your ballot in the mail - you don't have to worry because you'll be notified when it is received! (The envelope has pre-paid postage on it, so you don't even have to put a stamp on it - just put it in the mail.)

Drop-off locations, election office addresses and more is inside your County Voter Information Guide and Sample Ballot.

#### **Registering to Vote**

Did you know that you have until Election Day to register to vote? Whether you're registering for the first time or updating your voter registration info, all polling places and vote centers allow voters to register and vote in the same visit!

If you are already registered, you will need to re-register if you've changed your address, changed your name, want to change your political party, need to update your signature, or are no longer serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony. ## What to Know About Prop. 1

The League does both education and advocacy. On our website is a video with pros and cons and a statement of why the League of Women Voters of California opposes Proposition 1.

The measure on the March 5 ballot is: Mental Health Care and Addiction Treatment Reform & Bonds to Build Places for Treatment and Supportive Housing. If passed, Proposition 1 would:

- Authorize the issuance of bonds to raise \$6.4 billion: \$4.4 billion to build facilities for treatment of people with mental illness and substance use disorders, and \$2 billion to build or renovate housing for people who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness, or who have mental illness or substance use disorders.
- Shift approximately \$140 million of annual MHSA funding, currently available to counties for community-based mental health services, to the state for its mental health services.
- Divert roughly one third of all county MHSA funding currently used to provide mental health services
- including outpatient treatment, crisis response, early intervention, prevention and outreach, and

treatment for people with substance use disorder — to housing and personalized support services like employment assistance and education.

### The LWVC Opposition

The statement says, in part: "Although California has a critical need to resource better mental health and addiction services and to address our crisis of homelessness, the League of Women Voters of California opposes Proposition 1 for a number of important reasons. While the additional housing resources offered through Prop 1 are sorely needed, they do not outweigh its flaws."

## **Our Committees**



Sandy Grasso-Boyd and Ann Bailey of the LWVSB Environmental Action Committee addressed members of Santa Barbara County's Equity Advisory and Outreach Committee (EA+OC) at its Feb. 7 online meeting.

Sandy recently stepped down from her role as chair of the EAC (previously the Sustainable Communities Committee) for health reasons. Given her knowledge and long involvement with local environmental issues, however, Sandy's presentation raised concerns about California state budget cuts that could undermine environmental safeguards such as Health Protection Zones and Oil Drilling Setbacks. Both of these are likely to especially – and historically – impact underserved/underrepresented and other vulnerable communities.

EA+OC is a subcommittee of the Santa Barbara County Regional Climate Collaborative, a multi-sector network of organizations working together to advance climate mitigation and resiliency efforts in Santa Barbara County. The Collaborative advances regional-scale climate solutions through coordination and partnership.

#### This is achieved by:

- Identifying specific challenges within the topic area or practice that would be best addressed through a regional collaboration
- · Soliciting technical assistance & funding
- Conducting in-depth analysis, stakeholder engagement and developing recommendations
- · Piloting and launching programs, policies and projects
- Developing tools and resources
- Making recommendations to the Steering Committee

Ann Bailey participates on the EA+OC to represent the LWVSB's interests in taking positive environmental action.

### 10 Ways to Promote Trees

The League's Environmental Action Committee will meet Friday, March 8 at 10:30am to hear from guest speaker Ken Knight, who will be discussing "The top 10 things you can do to promote trees where you live and why your grandchildren will thank you."

Knight is a Consulting Arborist approved by Santa Barbara County. He was Executive Director of Goleta Beautiful for 13 years and since 2014 has been President of Your Children's Trees.

Linda Honikman, who organized the program, said the speaker will answer questions from committee members.

Do you like to meet new people? Are you a networker? We need a chair for the Membership Committee. That's how we grow and bring new talent into the League.



## **Our League Tells LWVUS Our Priorities**

On Valentine's Day League members met at the Community Environmental Council's HUB to discuss Program Planning for the coming LWVUS 2-year cycle. Several members attended by Zoom and about six members were present for our discussion.

Program Planning is the grassroots process of recommending and selecting governmental issues for study and agreement in reaching a position at the national level or in odd numbered years at the state level. In our local League this is also an opportunity to consider where and how we will focus our

resources (time, money, energy, and reputation) to make the most impact in our community over the next year.

In reviewing the national League Positions we noted that we use positions from the state and national League in our local work: citizen's right to vote, redistricting, money in politics or dark money, citizen's right to know or citizen participation, constitutional amendment proposals (Equal Rights Amendment), public policy on reproductive choices.

Within resource management we have reviewed issues about transfer of federal public lands, air quality, solid waste, nuclear waste, climate change, and water resources.

We are also focused on public participation, criminal justice, equality of opportunity, fair housing, nondiscrimination and affirmative action, equal rights, mental and physical health care (especially in our jails), immigration, meeting basic human needs, our housing supply and homelessness, violence prevention, gun policy, the death penalty and sentencing policy.

Additionally we are interested in international relations and global collaboration with a goal of good global governance. And overall, we strive to view all of our work through the lens of diversity, equality, and inclusion.

This is a long list of topics and we tend to focus our energy on just a few at a time, remembering that many other issues are important to us as well. Specific topics may be addressed with community forums and committee meetings. As issues present in our communities we may strive to address them and use our previously written positions as a support for "making our case" with our local residents and officials.

Members are welcome to dig into any topic that is of particular interest to them and present their thoughts to committee chairpersons or our board of directors. The vibrancy of our local League depends on our interests and efforts in "moving the needle" on issues of concern in our communities thereby making democracy work.


