

October Community Forum:

The Affordable Care Act: Just the Facts, Ma'am!

Wednesday, Oct. 17, noon - 2 p.m. Free and open to the public.

Louise Lowry Davis Community Center, 1232 De La Vina St.

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A non-biased explanation of local and state implementation of the federal Affordable Care Act will be given by local and statewide experts at our October Community Forum.

With the plethora of information—some accurate and some not—being distributed about health care reform, the League of Women Voters of Santa Barbara is working with the Children’s Health Initiative of Santa Barbara County to bring you accurate information.

The panelists will examine what impacts the Affordable Care Act bring to the experience of insured and currently uninsured patients, as well as the capacity and readiness of our local health care systems and community clinics to meet the expected increase in demand for health care services.

California is the first state to begin implementation of a Health Benefit Exchange. Information will also be shared concerning children enrolled in Healthy Families and the effects of their upcoming transition into Medi-Cal enrollment.

Presenters will be: Carmela Castellano-Garcia from Sacramento, President and CEO of the California Primary Care Association; Kandis Driscoll from Los Angeles, Workgroup Director, Insure the Uninsured Project; Cynder Sinclair, D.M., Chief Executive Officer, Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics; and Tara Dooley, M.Ed., Program Manager, Healthy Kids Santa Barbara and the Children’s Health Initiative of Santa Barbara County

This presentation follows up on last year’s successful collaboration between the League and the Children’s Health Initiative in bringing the latest information and knowledgeable presenters to Santa Barbara County to address questions about the Affordable Care Act.

Inside the League

November Discussion Units: State Greenhouse Gas Emission Reductions

The November discussion units will be based on state greenhouse gas reduction action. The basis of our unit discussion is the state legislation regarding the required Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and the Sustainable Committee Strategy (SCS). We will discuss the issues and see what member views are of the proposals for local implementation.

During the month of September, Santa Barbara County Association of Governments (SBCAG) held three public meetings to hear the opinions of residents regarding various plans to implement the state greenhouse gas reduction requirements.

In 2006, the state legislature passed AB32 setting the target date of 2020 to attain emission levels below those of 1990.

SB375 connects the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from cars and light trucks to land use; recommends streamlining the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and coordinates Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) process with the transportation plan.

Also to be considered are ways to reduce emissions, such as green building, energy and emission reduction, and conservation. In our county the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments (SBCAG), consisting of all supervisors and mayors, is responsible for attaining these goals.

Come to the November units to discuss the various plans and reactions.



Potentially Misleading Campaign Ads from Outside Groups Flood the Nation’s Television Airwaves

A record number of campaign advertisements are flooding the television airwaves in communities across the nation. Many of these ads are being run by “outside groups” that are supposedly independent from a candidate. These “outside group” ads (sometimes referred to as “third-party” ads) threaten to spread misinformation as studies have shown that these ads contain a higher level of both attacks and inaccurate statements than candidate campaign ads.

The League of Women Voters has long worked to ensure that voters receive fact-based, nonpartisan information about our elections, often partnering with the media to do so. We have heard from voters that they desperately want factual information so they can make their own best decisions. That is the goal of the League’s Truth in Campaign Advertising project. We are concerned that this current environment -- so filled with toxic charges, contradictory statements and deceptive practices -- leaves voters so confused and disgusted that at a minimum, they can’t make their own best decisions and at worst they may decide not to vote at all.

Television stations have a legal right to reject or request changes to any advertisement, other than from a qualified candidate, if the station believes the ad is inaccurate or misleading. Stations already have processes they use for

consumer product ads. So this is not a new practice for them. We are asking them to be as vigilant about outside group ads as they are about product ads.

Leagues, and individual League members, have a critical role to play in ensuring that their local stations—KEYT in Santa Barbara--understand and exercise their obligation and right.

The League of Women Voters’ Truth in Campaign Advertising project focuses on local Leagues working with and supporting their local television broadcasters to minimize false and misleading campaign ads. We can do this in two main ways. We can encourage stations to exercise their responsibility to ensure the campaign ads they run are accurate. We can also urge TV stations to air, as part of their news segments, stories that provide viewers with nonpartisan, objective analysis of the campaign ads being run on that station, thereby helping the voting public to be discerning viewers of the campaign ads they see.

Online Voter Registration: A Reality in California!

The League of Women Voters of California is excited about the implementation of online voter registration in our state. We applaud the work of the Secretary of State's office, in coordination with the Department of Motor Vehicles and the 58 county elections officials, to give Californians a more open and accessible registration process.

Now, any eligible California voter who has access to the Internet and a drivers license or ID signature on file with the DMV can register whenever and wherever it is convenient. The new system adds convenience for voters and improved accuracy for elections offices while maintaining the security of the registration process. We anticipate enthusiastic use of this new process; thousands of Californians had already registered online in the hours before its formal announcement.

The League of Women Voters encourages all people who are eligible to vote to register and to cast an informed vote in all elections. We believe in the power of the vote, and that

government should make voter registration and re-registration easy while assuring that the basic requirements of citizenship, age, and residency are met. We also believe that the state should continue to take a strong role in encouraging the facilitation of registration and voting.

Voter registration too frequently presents a barrier to eligible voters. Online voter registration will increase the number of registered voters and facilitate updates of voter registration for people who have moved or changed their name or political party by allowing them to do the process online. Online registration will help prevent errors in transcribing handwritten information on registration affidavits and will speed up recording of late registrations and cut down on errors. Voters will be better served AND millions of dollars will be saved.

We are proud to have been among the supporters of this great step forward.

VOTE411.org

Launched by the League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF) in October of 2006, VOTE411.org is a "one-stop-shop" for election related information. It provides nonpartisan information to the public with both general and state-specific information on the following aspects of the election process:

- Absentee ballot information
- Ballot measure information (where applicable)
- Early voting options (where applicable)
- Election dates
- Factual data on candidates in various federal, state and local races
- General information on such topics as how to watch debates with a critical eye
- ID requirements

- Polling place locations
- Registration deadlines
- Voter qualifications
- Voter registration forms
- Voting machines

An important component of VOTE411.org is the polling place locator, which enables users to type in their address and retrieve the poll location for the voting precinct in which that address is located. The League has found that this is among the most sought after information in the immediate days leading up to, and on, Election Day.

Ideas for Initiative & Referendum Reform: What the Legislators Say

One of the questions asked in this year's legislative interviews was whether the initiative and referendum process is in need of reform, and, if so, how it should be changed.

The vast majority of the responses received thus far indicate support for some kind of change. Several of the legislators expressed support for the overall intent of the initiative process—allowing a voice for the grassroots in the political process, while at the same time expressing the view that this is no longer the case. One of the many “yes, but” situations is finding a way to reduce the influence of special interests while also acknowledging the need to limit the overall number of initiatives.

Another idea that was mentioned by several legislators is the need for an initiative that will cost money to specify where that money will come from. This idea, while quite popular, runs counter to the League's position against earmarking funds. Our position is that we prefer that measures not include any earmarking, because it reduces the flexibility of the legislature in future years. The position is clear that we should only support a measure with earmarking if it also includes a sunset clause.

Other ideas suggested included ensuring that the language in initiatives is clear and understandable, strict interpretation of the single issue requirement for initiatives, requiring all measures be submitted to the California Supreme Court for a pre-election review for constitutionality, ensuring that the title and summary for each measure is impartial, and raising the filing fees. The fees have been the same since 1943, and do not come close to covering the cost of analyzing the measures, and writing the titles and summaries.

Support for the California DISCLOSE Act was mentioned, as were the ideas of changing the number of signatures required and putting a moratorium for some number of years on measures once an issue had been on a ballot. No one mentioned changing the length of time proponents have to collect signatures. There was support for making it more difficult to amend the constitution, as opposed to passing statutes.

Finally, one person mentioned limiting initiatives to only those issues over which the legislature has no authority, one supported returning to having elections for initiatives at both the primary and general elections, and another felt that spending limits only put groups with limited money at a disadvantage against those who can self-fund a campaign.

The Initiative and Referendum Update Study Committee is considering all these ideas, and more. The study guide and consensus questions have been developed.. Consensus reports will not be due until March 2013 so local Leagues can wait until after the upcoming November election to have their consensus meetings.
